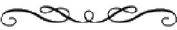

About Trinity Church

Trinity Church was organized in 1837 by the rector and members of St. Mary’s Church, Colestown (now Cherry Hill Township). An obelisk in Colestown Cemetery marks the site of St. Mary’s church, which burned to the ground in 1899. The Moorestown congregation raised funds for a church building to be erected on our present site; it was constructed and consecrated in 1838. The rector, The Reverend Francis P. Lee, noted, “It is a beautiful structure of brownstone, with a graceful spire and a comfortable basement story for the use of the Sunday School”. The current church complex was built in 1928 and was the gift of a single benefactor, Eldridge Johnson.

Trinity Church offers many opportunities for individuals and families to serve both in the church and in the community. By becoming involved in a commission or a specific event or ministry, you will meet other parishioners and hopefully become an integral part of our church family. Volunteer opportunities include: Fellowship, Property, Christian Formation, Outreach, Health and Music Commissions just to name a few.

There are many opportunities to participate in music at Trinity Church. The Trinity Choir is the primary parish choir and sings at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist. The choir sings a repertoire ranging from Renaissance motets to 20th century works. The Coventry Choir is a small ensemble that sings for the 11:15 a.m. service. The choir prepares its own repertoire of *a cappella* motets as well as canticles for Morning Prayer. The Canterbury Choir is for young singers in grades 4 and up; the Carol Choir is for those in grades 2 - 3; and the Cherub Choir for children in grades K-1.

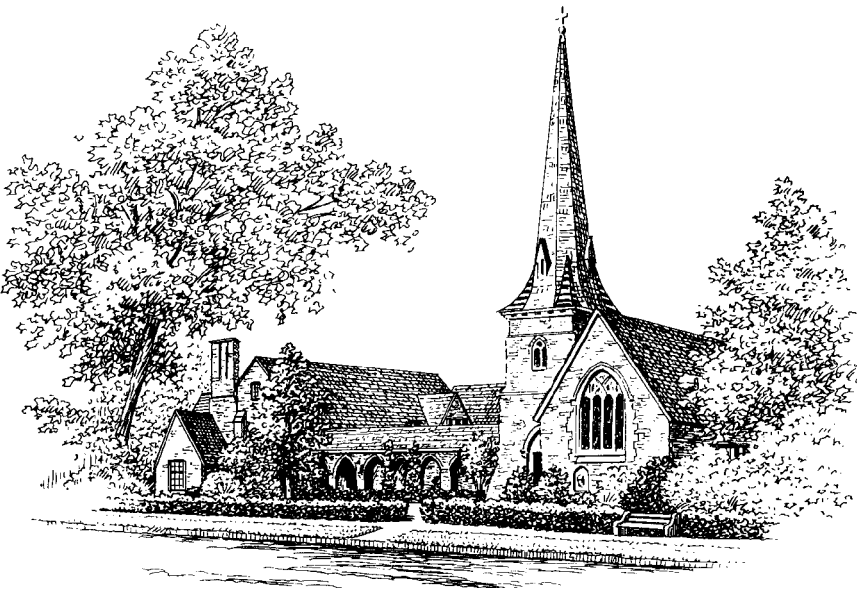

On Wednesday evenings in Lent at 7:30pm (2/21 through 3/21), join Mother Emily for a series on the Spirituality of Money. Money is an unavoidable part of our lives. Save the Date: On Sunday, February 25, at 3pm, Trinity will welcome Mr. Samuel C. Still III who will share the story of his illustrious family. He will tell us about several of his ancestors, beginning with Levin and Charity Still, both born into slavery, who through perseverance and courage became freed people and who eventually settled in Burlington County, and several of their children, including William Still, a Philadelphia abolitionist known as the "Father of the Underground Railroad," and Dr. James Still, known as the "Doctor of the Pines." Please join us for Mr. Still's slide presentation in the church at 3PM. Light refreshments will be served in the Parish Hall following the presentation. A free will offering will be taken.

We look forward to welcoming the Reverend Dr. J.R. Norwood to Trinity on February 25 to preach at the 7:45 and 9:00 services. Dr. Norwood was raised in Moorestown and graduated from Moorestown High School where he was an active member of the student body and President of the African American Club. Dr. Norwood earned a Bachelors Degree in Philosophy from Howard University, a Master's Degree in Philosophy from Princeton Theological Seminary, and a Doctorate in Missiology (the study of missions) from Northwest University, Potchefstroom, South Africa. Having been ordained a Methodist in the mid-1980s, Dr. Norwood subsequently became part of the World Reformed Fellowship.

Pastor Norwood has been in ordained ministry for thirty-four years and a pastor for thirty years, serving as a church pastor as well as a college, military, and correctional chaplain. He has a passion for both learning and teaching, having served as a field supervisor for both Princeton Theological Seminary and the New Brunswick Theological Seminary, and also as a member of the faculty of the Eastern School of Christian Ministry of Palmer Seminary.

In addition to his pastoral duties, Dr. Norwood currently serves as Principal Supreme Court Justice of the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape Tribal Nation. He has written numerous articles and books about the history of Native American People and has worked arduously to preserve their history and culture. Dr. Norwood is also a pastoral volunteer to the Christian Prayer Circle of the Nanticoke Lenni-Lenape American Tribal Nation.

Currently Reverend Dr. Norwood serves as the pastor of Ujima Village Christian Church in Ewing, New Jersey. He and his beloved wife and partner in ministry, Tanya, have three children and three grandchildren.
